Every year, almost 3,000 people die from fires across the United States, one every 2-1/2 hours, and someone is injured every 30 minutes. Approximately every 22 seconds a fire department responds to a fire with a home fire reported every 90 seconds. In addition to the toll of human lives lost and injured, fires cause \$10 billion in property damage, according to information compiled by the National Fire Protection Association.



The fire problem has a significant negative effect upon our society and economy and there are a number of different approaches that we can take to address it. One of them is educating people as to their personal responsibility when it comes to fire safety. If we can prevent a fire from breaking out in the first place we can avoid having the tragic outcomes that are repeated every single day in cities and towns across the country.



But where to start? By teaching today's college students about fire safety, we can have a dramatic impact upon fire safety on campuses and for the years after they graduate, saving tens of thousands of lives and untold numbers of injuries. What they learn about fire safety while in school are lessons that they need to know for the rest of their lives – indeed, "fire safety is a part of living."
